## SUZAN-LORI PARKS'S CALENDAR



This calendar may contain 365 plays for 365 days, but it's only got twelve holidays... and for some reason you have to place them yourself?

- There is one holiday per month. Each is observed by taking a certain action.
- For the purposes of this puzzle, spring is March through May, summer is June through August, fall is September through November, and winter is December through February.
- The calendar is not treated as looping (so that if Holiday A is described as being three months after Holiday B, Holiday A cannot be in January).
- 1. The holiday on which you **dig in a sandbox** is before <u>Afternoon of the Elves</u>, but after the holiday on which you **cuddle a pet or loved one**.
- 2. The holiday on which you **try to build a fire** is four months before <u>Evening Gown</u> Day.
- 3. <u>Plastic Dinosaur Day</u> is either three months before or three months after the holiday on which you **tell people to have a delicious day**.
- 4. <u>Upside Down Day</u> is not in the fall, nor is the day on which you **invent a story** about a favorite creature.
- 5. Wet Beast Day is in the second half of the year, and is before the holiday on which you party with ninety or more friends.
- 6. The holiday on which you **paint a picture of someone or something you miss** is either in May or February. Whichever month it isn't in is the month of <u>Eggplant Parmigiana Day</u>.
- 7. Wobbly Stump Day, which is in the fall, features an observance that can be done alone.
- 8. <u>Pancake Toppings Day</u> and <u>Green Tea Day</u> are consecutive in some order. The former is adjacent to a holiday whose observance also starts with P.
- 9. The holiday where you **eat a cookie in the park**, the one where you **go from place to place handing out gifts**, and the one where you **shout or yell loudly** are the last holidays of their respective seasons.
- 10. The holiday where you **hide in a tower and make strange sounds** and the holiday where you **make a new crayon color** are two months after and five months after <u>Ash Tree Day</u>, in some order.
- 11. <u>Blocks Party</u> is in the summer and its observance is something that very young children should not do.
- 12. <u>Broken Umbrella Day</u> is in the first half of the year, and its observance does not involve interacting with other people.
- 13. The first holiday of the year starts with P and its observance is animal-related.
